'Hoosiers' Aboard the Sultana

When the steamship "Sultana" exploded and burned just after 2:00 A.M. on 27 April 1865, she was transporting homeward about 2,300 Union soldiers who had previously been imprisoned in in the South. The U.S. Civil War now over; everyone aboard was eager to arrive home to friends and family.

Unfortunately, many never made it. Estimates vary but about 1,800 soldiers were killed in the Sultana tragedy. 98% of those aboard hailed from just five states; Ohio, Tennessee, Indiana, Michigan, or Kentucky.

Indiana had about 460 'Hoosiers' aboard the Sultana. While two in three Indianians survived, 153 died in America's worst-ever maritime tragedy. Could one or more belong to your family tree? 

Ripley County Historical Society members Floyd Engel, Helen Einhaus, and Kathleen Lane provide a tour of the Smith-Engel Log Cabin as well as other historical sites for Dr. and Mrs. G. Ray Funkhouser, a descendant of Jacob Funkhouser, who built the cabin in 1833 on land in the Napoleon area. The Funkhousers made their first visit to this area on Monday, June 22. He is a college professor and author of two books.

Log cabin visited by Funkhouser descendant

Dr. and Mrs. G. Ray Funkhouser of Fort Washington, PA, visited the Smith Engel Log Cabin erected behind the Ripley County Historical Museum on Main and Water streets in Versailles as a special part of his trip to this area on Monday, June 22.

The great, great, great grandson of Jacob Funkhouser, who built the log cabin after he and family members came to Ripley County from Beaver County, PA in 1833, Funkhouser had not been in the area before. He and his wife were guests of Mrs. Helen Todd Einhaus and Mrs. Kathleen Marsh Lane, members of the Ripley County Historical Society, for a tour of the log cabin, the museum, and the archives at the Old Bank Building in Versailles.

Also in attendance was Floyd Engel, who had lived in the log cabin earlier in his life. In. fact. according to records from the Historical Society, a Smith family that possibly was connected to the Funkhousers lived in the

Flora Smith and Peter Engel's son Dan later married Ida Strobel. Thus many Engel family members lived in the house through the years, and apparently from the family connections, it became known as the Smith-Engel Cabin. The Arnold Wehr family donated the weather boarded log cabin to the Ripley County Historical Society in 1979. Volunteers of the Society and many interested people of the county helped restore the cabin to its present site. Floyd Engel remembers living in the cabin with his brother Robert and sister Evelyn when they were children in the 1 940's. Floyd continues to help the Society with

the maintenance of the cabin. According to information in the Ripley County Historical Society, Inc. brochure, "the Log Cabin was built in the 1830's by Jacob Funk-

For the Funkhousers the trip to Ripley County was an opportunity to visit many sites of his ancestors as well as to log information for family history. An author of two books, Dr. Funkhouser received his doctorate in communications from Stanford University. He was a lecturer of marketing at the Wharton School as well as an organizational consultant to top corporations such as American Express and Bank of America. He is presently a professor at the Rutgers Graduate School of Man-

In appreciation of their hospitality, Funkhouser presented autographed copies of his book THE POWER OF PERSUASION (A Guide to Moving Ahead in Business and Life) published by

He has also co-authored with R. Richard Ritti the book THE ROPES TO SKIP AND THE
