NOTES FROM THE WINTER MEETING

The R.C.H.S. met in the bank building on the square January 12 with a nice turnout. An update on the progress of the building work was given by Norris Krall. Among the things to be addressed are roof and gutter repair, a window replacement, ceiling tile repair and the addition of interior lights.

The society members also discussed placing signs at the sites where the Hanging Tree and Gordon's Leap once stood. The cost of the signs was noted, as well as the need to obtain the permission of the current property owners for the signs. The group voted to look into the matter further.

In other business, the Secretary's and treasurer's reports were read and approved, and it was reported that \$2,500 had been moved into the club's checking account to cover insurance costs on society property. Also a committee was formed (consisting of Alice Glover, Henry Walker and Helen Caplinger) to secure society directors from Adams, Brown, Center and Delaware townships.

Before the meeting was adjourned, a directors' meeting was scheduled for the second Sunday in March at 2 PM in the bank building. The next meeting of the RCHS will be in April with Center township as host.

A FORTY YEAR MYSTERY

Andrew Paul in the Role of Rip Van Winkle -- A strange case.

Farmers Retreat, a little village twenty miles back of Lawrence-burg, Ind., is excited over the solution of a forty-year mystery. A few days ago there arrived a patriachial-looking man, eighty three years old. He was recognized as Andrew Paul, who strangely disappeared nearly half a century ago. His story is a romance, a veritable Rip Van Winkle in real life. In 1850 Paul, who tilled a farm where the village of Friendship now flourishes, was attracted to the gold fields of California.

He left his wife and five small children behind, while he went to accumulate a fortune. For several years afterwards a correspondence was kept up with the abandoned family and then all communication ceased. For over twenty years the wife mourned the missing husband as dead, and cherished his memory by remaining a widow. Then came the surprising intelligence that he was not dead but still lived, following the ignis fatnus of deceiving fortune in the gold mining regions of his first allurement.

Deserted and lonely, the patient but ignored wife applied for and obtained a divorce in the circuit court of Ripley County, Ind., and soon after married Thomas Neighbert. A few years later he, like the husband preceding, Mr. Paul, died and for the second time she was left alone, her children having all married and gone from home.

Notwithstanding her unfortunate marital yentures, she still believed that marriage was not a failure, and for the third time enlistened in that line by marrying B.F. Davis. This last partnership proved no more lasting than the others, for this third husband (xxxxx three words unreadable where it was folded) her by (another blank) death, leaving her desolate in her aged widowhood. Having inherited a large fortune from the estate of her deceased father, Thomas Wilson, and being the possessor of nearly \$100,000 the kind-hearted old lady became more generous in her charities and benevolence, and the poor and needy absorbed her daily care and attention. About a month ago she was stricken down with disease and lay sick in the very room where, some ten years ago, her brother, James Wilson, struggled for weeks with grim death while recovering from the wounds made by thirteen bullets fired into his body by a brother-in-law.

Being told by her physicians that she could not live much longer she directed that her children be summoned to her bedside as she desired to see them before she died. With the coming of the children the love of fifty years before came also, and she asked that the long-absent and divorced Andrew Paul be telegraphed for. The message reached him and a response from California told of his starting to meet the woman he had not seen since he bade her good-bye as his wife forty years before. The news of his coming cheered the old lady, and she began to improve in health. Children and grand-children were around her, but the lover and husband of other days was still absent, and her aged eyes kept looking longingly out the window down the old lane leading to the house.

A few mornings since, as she sat propped up in bed her face suddenly brightened with a smile as she exclaimed, "He is coming"

and soon a pair of horses dashed up to the door drawing a carriage, from which alighted Andrew Paul, not the vigerous man who walked away from the same residence forty years before, buoyant with hope and glowing with bright anticipations, but a white-haired old man, broken down with the weight of more than four-score years, who gazed with a sort of Rip Van Winkle air on the scene of long ago. The meeting of the old couple was a most affectionate one, and the joy of the occasion propelled the old lady far on the road to recovery, and the culmination of this Indiana romance promises to be attained in a few weeks when the long-separated pair are again made husband and wife never again to part this side of the grave.

INDIANA TAX CREDITS STILL AVAILABLE:

This is the last chance to receive an Indiana tax credits against 1997 Indiana Gross Income taxes by making a contribution to the Building Fund of the Ripley County Historical Society. Tax Credits will be available until June 30, 1997. If you wish to take advantage of this benefit to reduce the out-of-pocket effect of your contribution to the RCHS program to restore, repair and equip the Versailles Bank Building as the headquarters and library of your Historical Society contact Norris E. Remember, if your contribution is \$100 or more you will receive credit against your 1997 Indiana Gross Income taxes of 50% of your contribution. Also, if you itemize on your Federal Income Tax return, you will also receive a tax benefit equivalent to your effective Federal Tax rate.

If your contribution is \$1,000 or more, you will be recognized on the carved plaque to be placed in the lobby or our building. If you made a contribution in 1996 of less than \$1,000 and now wish to increase your total contribution to \$1,000, your name or the name of a loved one may still be included on our plaque. Be sure to notify Norris of your wishes.

All contributors will be recognized in a future edition of the newsletter and a list of all contributors will be retained in the permanent files of the Society.
