Ohio, California, 4, Minnesota 2, and Eli, 1 born in Indiana. In 1852 he was with Clark-Skidmore part who went west to California. He kept a diary of the trip--The diary was given to the Huntington Library at San Marino, California by his gr-gr-grandaughter but the library has no record of her name. 1923- The Benham roads were so fierce, a 4 horse team was required for school kids deliver Sedam, to convey his passengers to and from the Hyatt School. Next time you complain about roads, think twice.

The Henderson Family cemetery is on the old Henderson place It is about 4 miles east of Versailles. Edward Henderson was buried there in 1840. Born in Ireland in 1776 he was the 1st preacher at the Old Log church in Bethel.

I have been browsing over an old cash book of a Holton Store December 27th 1875 to Sept 21, 1876. 256 pages of names with their purchases. The store carried a complete line of goods for that time period. Yard goods, dishes, nails, sugar, salt, castor oil, buttons, clothing, saddles and bridles etc. C. Williams bought a pr of pants for \$1.50. Lawrence Miller 1 paper needles 10¢ Jonathan Coon, 4 lbs bacon 67c, 1 lb butter 15¢ Jacob Young 14 yards muslin 1.12 8¢ a vard. Holman Yater-Spool thread 5¢ Cole oil 5¢ Henry Yater- 2 gal molasses 25¢-2 Lb coffee 50¢,3 plugs tobacco 30¢ William Wooley a broom for 25¢ Thomas Bruce-bushel meal 65¢ an ax Handle 20¢ George Allen got a pr of boots for 4.25 , so did Silvester Waters J. D. Cofield pr of pants cost him 5.50. Some were credited with produce , meat, eggs and chickens. Some of the names of persons are still around. I even found where my grandfather Marion Beach bought a 1b of soda for 10¢ and Melitis Downey bought asafity for 10¢ The writing is very neat and the spelling is someone who was taught phonics.



The Funkhouser Log Cabin stood on the land of Jacob Funkhouser's original land entry of 1833. Also entering land on the same day was one of his sons, David Funkhouser, and son-in-law Benjamin Kaster. Other family members, the Castor, Main and Vankirk families, lived nearby and they all contributed to the early formation of the Napoleon and Old Salem Church area. Jacob and Nancy Showalter Funkhouser are buried at Old Salem Cemetery.

John P. and Parthena Smith's land, also in Section 15, adjoined the Funkhouser property. When John P. Smith died August 9, 1855 at age 42 he was buried underneath a tree near his home. In 1907 the Funlahouser property was sold to August G. Lauber, son of Peter and Anna Engel Lauber and grandson of Valentine and Magdalena Smith Lauber, Dan Engel purchased the land in 1914. In time the cabin was referred to as the

Smith-Engel cabin.

Funkhouser Smith-Engel Cabin

When the Arnold Wehr family gave the cabin to RCHS in 1979 it was dismantled and moved to its present site behind the RCHS Museum. The Museum was formerly the Grand Army of the Republic Hall until 1930 when it was donated to RCHS as a memorial to the Civil War Veterans.

The cabin is deteriorating and must soon receive significant maintenance. We are trying to locate a log cabin preservationist to advise us what steps to take. We have had much interest from different branches of the Funkhouser family and know they will be interested in this project.

Underground Railroad History

The Underground Railroad was neither "underground" nor a "railroad." Rather it refers to the 19th Century movement of enslaved African-Americans seeking freedom in the North and the assistance they received on their journey. Extensive research has been done the last few years on this ongoing project by the Department of Natural Resources - Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology.
