The second meeting of the Ripley County Historical Society for the year 2005 will be Sunday afternoon, April 10th, starting at 2:00, in the RCHS Library on the west side of the courthouse square in Versailles, Indiana. The special guest speaker will be Mr. Dan Matiatos, the Assistant Manager of Big Oaks National Wildlife Refuge. His topic will be on wildlife refuge activities in general and Big Oaks Refuge in specific. Mr. Matiatos was born in North Dakota and has worked in Northwest including Alaska for several years and has recently started his service as a wildlife operations specialist at Big Oaks. Big Oaks Refuge was formed on 50,000 acres of land within the Jefferson Proving Ground. This topic is one of great interest to local residents and everyone is invited to attend.

Activities at the Archives:

- ▶ Helen Einhaus and helpers will soon finish the huge project of compiling and updating the Jackson Township Cemetery records. Old newspapers, Toph papers, Phyllis Miller's records, archives records, individual cemetery records, etc. are being diligently researched and recorded. Jackson Township RCHS Director, Andy Scholle, who is a surveyor by trade, has used GPS to identify and plot several cemeteries. Delbert and Dorothy Abplanalp, and Helen Caplinger have helped Mrs. Einhaus and husband Wayne, interview residents and tract down leads by visiting old abandoned grave sites which are usually found in a wooded area. Patty Lawrence has spent hours entering information in the computer. Norris Krall is helping get the material ready for publication. There seems to be no end to this project as new (old unknown) information keeps turning up. Included are cemeteries from around Napoleon as well as the Flat Rock Cemetery, which Don Hughes and Willard Tucker have updated to include 2004. This information will be made into the "Jackson Township, Ripley County, Indiana Cemeteries" book and will sell for \$10.
- ▶ A reminder to everyone seeking research help: Do not send your request by e-mail. We are not staffed sufficiently to handle all the e-mails. You must send your request in regular mail accompanied by a self-addressed, stamped, large envelope and a check for \$3 for each family name requested, you will be billed for the copying cost and any extra postage when material is sent. Also, be sure to send enough information for us to be sure we know the person on whom, you are requesting information.

MINUTES OF THE RIPLEY COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The January 9, 2005 meeting of the Ripley County Historical Society was called to order by President Betty Roepke. The 33 members and guests present were welcomed and each told their name and where they reside. Secretary Henry Walker was absent so minutes of last meeting were read by Norris Krall. Beatrice Boyd gave the Treasurer's report, both reports were accepted as read. A nominating committee of Esther Edmondson, Don Nealis and Helen Decker was appointed to find Directors for townships of Laughery, Otter Creek, Shelby, and Washington, to be elected at April meeting.

Wilbur Myers of Holton reported that when the tornado hit Holton on July 30, 2004, there was so much damage to a house he owns, that it will not be repaired. The house was one of the oldest in town and there are some salvageable materials available. Anyone interested should talk to him.

Jerry Wilson, who is a fifth grade teacher at South Ripley Elementary School of Versailles, gave a very interesting account of the Meriwether Lewis and William Clark expedition. Mr. Wilson dressed in an outfit similar to what the explorers would have worn in the early 1800's. He displayed a large collection of supplies and guns used during that period. Mr. Wilson, also, showed several pictures and a map of the Lewis and Clark trail route. The expedition was done under the direction of President Thomas Jefferson and their efforts were very important in the development of our Country. Everyone present received a pamphlet with information and pictures of the Lewis and Clark trip. It was a very interesting and informative program.

The meeting was adjourned and refreshments served by Otter Creek Township.

He is attempting to find the Indiana families of these heroes to send a free photograph of the gravesite. Some died in battle in the Philippine Islands, Solomon Islands, New Guinea, Guam and Mariana Islands while others died in prison camps. This was an all day affair. Following the excercises, a picture was taken of the graduating class in the area center of the Racetrack by Otto White. Many of these photos have been given to the RCHS and are in the museum. Some are framed but many are in the cardboard circle they were mailed in.





The first sidewalks in Versailles were laid from Wingates: corner to the square at a cost of \$100.


The Court House Inn is under new management. It also has a new name. Yellow Dog Tavern and Eatery.










Ripley County is one of two Indiana counties that have the most stone arch bridges (the other county being Decatur). The bridges were constructed between 1870 and 1910. Eleven bridges still carry traffic daily. We also have several smaller bridges that are classified as culverts. Culverts are those that have a span of less than 20 feet. Gradually we are losing these bridges as they are replaced by more modern structures. Stone Arch bridges are an engineering marvel considering the equipment the builders had to use to cut, haul and erect the stone. At least five of our stone arch bridges have been demolished in recent years. RCHS is very concerned about preserving these historic assets.
