ITEMS FROM THE FALL MEETING

The R.C.H.S. met October 9 at 2 o'clock in the Annex at Versailles. President Randy Young opened the meeting. Each of the 24 people attending introduced themselves and told where they resided.

The secretary's and treasurer's reports were read and approved. Bea Boyd explained all the expenses for the past three months. She was happy to report that the society had received \$2,000 from the Tyson Fund. Her checking balance was \$174.16.

Dennis Hardin from Indianapolis had visited the museum. He told us there might be a grant which the society would be able to use in the future for microfilming.

The meeting was then turned over to Bea Boyd who had searched the Historical Society records. She found that the society was formed Sept. 2, 1880. Many people over the years had worked hard to keep the society alive. Some of the highlites were:

1921 It was noted that Stephen Harding addressed the society.

1956 The Violet Toph papers were in the process of being catalogued.

1970 The Society was reorganized. O. S. Patterson conducted the meeting. At this time Lois Thompson was working very hard getting the Toph papers catalogued.

1973 The Annex was purchased for the sum of \$6,600.

1981 Micro film was purchased. At present bulletins are printed four times a year and sent to each member. Over the years many people have helped beyond the usual call of duty. Some we might mention are: Lois and Herbert Thompson and Ann Gibbs.

At one time Brown Twp. had a Historical Society. No other information has been found at this time. In the old minutes it is stated that the Friendship Bank turned the Brown Twp. monies over to R.C.H.S.

NOTES FROM INDIANA HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Winners of the Indiana "Signs of the Times" photography contest have been chosen from one hundred and sixteen contestents. Most winners were from the Indianapolis area; none from our area. Many entries are on display through Jan. 14 at the Society, 315 W. Ohio, Indianapolis.

The legendary sounds of Hoosier songwriter, jezz composer, pienist and singer Hoagy Carmichael have been captured by the Indiana Historical Society in a special four-album set, The Classic Hoagy Carmichael, now available to the public.

A copublication of the Society and the Smithsonian Institution's Collection of Recordings, the album contains 57 selections performed by such great names in popular music and jazz as Louis Armstrong, Ray Charles, Bing Crosby, Tommy Dorsey, Duke Ellington, Ella Fitzgerald, Benny Goodman, Glenn Miller, Frank Sinatra and Carmichael himself. The album also includes a lavishly illustrated 64 page booklet detailing Carmichael's life and work.

Researched, compiled and produced by Dr. John Edward Hasse, curator of American Music at the Smithsonian Institution, the album has been nearly eight years in the making. The collection is the most comprehensive record ever devoted to Carmichael and surveys his entire career, including his greatest hits and some little-known songs deserving wider recognition.

With Carmichael's best songs, Hasse said it was difficult to select a single recording. Consequently, there are two versions each of "Georgia On My Mind", "Lazy River", "The Nearness of You", "Rockin' Chair" and "Skylark". In the case of perhaps Carmichael's best-known piece, "Stardust", Hasse has included six different recordings, the first by Louis Armstrong in 1931 and 53 years later, another by leading trumpeter, Wynton Marsalis.

COXEY'S CANE

In 1931 Lewis Heimseth of Batesville gave to the museum a cane that had been in the possession of his father, John F., who lived in

Napoleon, IN and had died in 1913 at the age of 83.

This interesting article, at one time, belonged to Jacob Coxey of Massilon, Ohio. "General" Jacob S. Coxey came into prominence in 1894 when he headed a group of "Common Wealers" or "Industrials" who had assembled in the western states and started the march from St. Louis and marching to Washington D.C. to bring before Congress the greivances of the laboring class of people, during the second administration of Grover Cleveland.

This so called army encamped at Napoleon one night, pitching large tents of the town square (Commons). (This is where the school house is now located). Some of this group disbanded at Lawrenceburg, IN. Coxey finally reached Washington D.C. April 28 with 350 men and attempted a demonstration near the capitol on May 1 and was arrested. He was released June 10, having meantime been nominated in Ohio for Congress.

I often heard the expression that someone looked "like Coxey's Army". They looked like a group of ragamuffins. So I suppose it wasn't unusual during the "Great Depression" for groups of people to "look like Coxey's Army".
