JANUARY MEETING

The October meeting was held the 11th of October. The minutes were read and the treasurer's report was made by Bea Boyd.

The sales of the reprinted 1st volume of the Ripley County History has been wonderful; with people purchasing the Sets, Vol I & II, as often as they buy just the Vol I book.

Membership is picking up nicely. In the last quarter there have been 5 or 6 new members signed up by the librarians.

A binding machine has been added to the inventory of machines that RCHS has. Dare we hope that another township cemeteries book is in the works for publishing? Maybe a members cookbook is on the agenda? Stay tuned for further information.

The old archives building has had a facelift. New siding was installed this past fall, and various minuscule repairs done at the same time.

The Ripley County Historical Society met October 11, 1998 in the RCHS library on court house square in Versailles.

The meeting was called to order, by President Alice McCoy. Everyone introduced themselves with name and township or city. Alice read the Secretary report that was in the newsletter that was put out in August. She explained that the newsletter was out in August instead of October so that people could be informed of the sale of the Volume I History Book.

Treasurers report was given by Bea Boyd of the accounts and book sales and money from the Tyson Fund, in the amount of \$500. President McCoy said we appreciate the money received from the Tyson Fund and also all donations made.

A grant from Eli Lily had been applied for. The application for the grant was done by Carolyn Hahn. It was reported we would receive \$57,000 to be used on the Museum building only. We would receive the money in November.

President Alice reported that the signs came in on 2 October. They have poles and bolts with them. The Hanging Tree sign will be placed a that site. Alan Smith had checked to see where the property was and who owned it. It was owned by the Cliff Hill cemetery so this is no problem. The sign was installed in November by Alice McCoy and Alan Smith. There are four signs for the Museum. They will be placed on the Manship farm on 421 between Osgood and Versailles by the Feeder Auction Barn and at Hoosier Hills corner. Two signs remain to be placed.

The By-Law committee asked for extra time since they had been busy with book sales.

President Alice reported on the Directors meeting.

Alan Smith said he would be chairman of the Building and Property committee. Carolyn Hahn will check with contractors on the Museum building.

The Bake Sale during the Pumpkin Show, headed by Betty Roepke, was reported on. The winner of the pillows from the raffle was Betty Bustle of Dabney. The winner of the Volume II History Book was Cheryl Welch of Correct.

Lori asked about purchasing newspapers on microfilm. This was postponed because the purchase of the reprint books had diminished the checking and savings accounts.

President McCoy read a letter from Helen Einhaus regarding the Ripley County Millennium Committee. Helen had attended the 7 October 1998 meeting, representing RCHS. Their next meeting would be on 28 October.

A suggestion was made by Fran Campbell regarding having a key available at the archives for the Museum in case one needs to get in with a patron. Kathleen Lane said Dan Goris has the key to put a lock on the front door of the museum. Charles Roepke says to put in a dead bolt lock.

Alice said we needed a director from Delaware and Franklin Townships. We also need a Secretary. Lori asked about the secretary being someone besides a director. Alice says unless the By-laws are changed it will not apply.

The meeting was turned over to Betty Roepke, Vice President and program director.

David Dreyer from Indianapolis, introduced his cousin Allan Sunman and wife Ann. Allan gave a quick version of his line. He is a direct descendent from William Sunman. George Sunman, a bookbinder, was his grandfather. Alan's father was born in 1893 and died young. Alan has four children. Arriving late were some Sunmans from Greenfield and Rushville. David Dreyer announced it was a Sunman reunion. Mary Hess from Cincinnati, related to the Sunmans, attended the meeting.

A program was given by Kevin Vinson from Sunman. He has restored Pipe Creek Cemetery in Adams Township. Richard Wortman was the first white man in the township to be buried there. He died 23 June 1850 at the age of 60. He was a Kentucky Volunteer in 1812. Many Clarks, Hazens and soldiers in the Civil Ware are buried there. Kevin became interested in restoring when he did his own home. He is now restoring the old Price Hotel. It contains a bar bought from Hudepohl in 1905 and is being preserved. George Price was a son-in-law to Schucks. Everyone enjoyed the pictures he had brought.

Also from a distance was Martha Binford from Louisville. Formerly of Holton she was the daughter of John Ward and wife, who was a Shockley. John Ward was druggist and Postmaster at Holton in the early 1900's. They moved to Indianapolis. Mrs. Ward is still living at the age of 103.

The meeting was dismissed and refreshments were served by Carolyn Hahn of Laughery Township.

"Once upon a time it was rumored that marble was found in a valley in Jefferson County, Indiana, hence the valley where it was found was called Marble Valley. When people came into the southwestern part of Ripley County, they decided to call the little log school house where church was held the Marble Corner school and church because it was at the corner of Marble Valley. This old building was nearly a mile morth the present little village of Marble Corner on the farm of Ed Rea. A second school was built where the present cemetery is, then the third school just across the road from the cemetery. The church was built east of the school in 1893, an M. E. Church.
