- A Veterinarian from Milan, Dr. William Glover, died at age 88. At a meeting in 1988, he shared his experiences of serving in the Army Air Force during WWII. He was shot down and captured in Germany were he was a POW for 20 months. Dr. Glover served several years as RCHS Director from Franklin Township, retiring 1998, due of failing health.
- Charles Roepke died at age 77. He was a farmer and business man from Sunman. Charles was a US Army veteran, serving 1945 to 1947. Charles was active in the RCHS, faithful to attend meetings and help his wife, Betty, who is the Adams Township Director, and a past President. Due to a stroke, Charles came to the meetings in a wheel chair the last couple of years.

STEPHEN S. HARDING ROOM OPEN AT ANNEX

The Stephen H. Harding Room opened May 15th as part of our Underground Railroad Historical Markers dedication ceremonies. The room is decked out in a lovely Chinese rug in shades of rose with touches of turquoise blue within a darker border. It is believed to have been woven about one hundred years ago. This is a gift of Mrs. Theresa Smith Smith, daughter of Alan and Katy Smith. Hanging from the ceiling is a beautiful chandelier, a gift of Charles and Jacqueline Rohlfing of Milan. The antique Victorian chandelier has a painted dome shade with prisms, brass rings, chains and blue glass parts that match the blue in the carpeting. Judge and Katherine Taul donated the Victorian lace panel covering the window.

A drawing of the first Ripley County Court House by Alan F. Smith is a gift from his family in his memory and hangs above the Harding piano. The first court house erected on the Courthouse Square, built in 1821 by George Craig, stood until 1861, and it was at this court house that Jonathan Gordon threw open the courthouse doors and Stephen S. Harding gave his antislavery speech in 1844. Portraits of Harding's anti-slavery friends, Col. James H. Cravens, his son Major John O. Cravens and Jonathan Gordon, Esq. also adorn the room.

Rosewood Square Piano The beautiful rosewood square piano of the Harding family was easily and successfully moved from the Museum to the Annex. The Lighte Newton Piano Company who manufactured the piano, No. 5046, was established in 1848 at 22 Canal Street in New York City and operated under this name until 1851 when it became Light, Newton & Bradbury, according to Dwight Newton of the University of Kentucky School of Music. Moving of the piano was accomplished through funding provided by the Friendship State Bank, so deeply appreciated by everyone.

Mrs. Ella Yater Row, daughter of Abraham and Alciene Harding Yater, maintained the Harding Homestead in Old Milan as an historical site following the Feb. 12, 1891 death of her Grandfather Harding. She worked incessantly to maintain community awareness of the historic Harding family. In later years Dr. and Mrs. Perrie A. Row's home in Osgood was filled with her grandparents' antique furnishings. When it came time to dismantle the household after the death of Dr. and Mrs. Row their daughter Elizabeth donated, on behalf of the Harding Family, the lovely old piano and piano stool, as well as Stephen Harding's black silk top hat complete with his hatbox. The top hat graces the fireplace mantel in the Harding room.

Antique Clock The lovely old clock is believed to have come to Indiana with David and Abigail Hill Harding who moved to Ripley County, from New York State in 1832. The clock always stood in the Stephen S. Harding home and was passed on to their granddaughter Ella Yater Row. Upon the death of Mrs. Row, the clock was given to her granddaughter Mary Row and now is on Ioan. Brass works is believed to be English, the dial and case made of wood during the Federal period, ca 1750-1780.

Eastlake Glider On loan by Esther Lauber Edmondson. Many hours passed while S. S. Harding, blind the last ten years of life, sat in his favorite walnut glider, rocking and composing poetry. Ownership of the rocker passed from Ella Row to Dr. Irving and Elizabeth Lauber Row of Osgood and then to their niece Esther Lauber Edmondson. Mrs. Edmondson reupholstered the rocker-glider in a deep rose plush fabric.

Two Portraits of Stephen S. Harding, family photos, and blue glass plate. Donated by Diane Perrine Coon: Courtesy of the Utah State Historical Society Photo Archives. (1)Portrait is that of Harding as a young attorney who walked from his home in Old Milan to Brookville to study law. As County Attorney, he set up his law office in the upstairs office of the old courthouse and became a firebrand antislavery orator. (2) Portrait of Hon. Stephen S. Harding, Governor of Utah Territory and later Chief Justice of the State of Colorado. Various Harding family photos have been copied and are seen throughout the room.

An Early American Drop Leaf Secretary holds copies of some of Harding's business and personal letters and poetry, as well as a Harding Memorial Plate (1856-1956) loaned by great-granddaughter Mary Row Lovins.

The Victorian three-piece parlor set of Dr. and Mrs. James Lamb, donated earlier by Dorothy English, completes the room setting.

We are deeply indebted to those who helped us bring this all together in time for the May ceremonies and those who have loaned or donated to the Harding Room. AMAZING TURNOUT FOR FREEDOM TRAILS MARKER DEDICATIONS

Although it rained, the visitors and RCHS members were not deterred from celebrating the dedication of the Harding marker on Courthouse Square at Versailles and the Union Flat Rock Church marker and the opening of the Harding Room at the RCHS museum annex on May 15. At least 100 attended the celebration at Versailles and 200 at Flat Rock.

Local newspapers – Osgood Journal and Versailles Republican, the Batesville Herald-Tribune, the Lawrenceburg Press, the North Vernon Plain Dealer, the Roundabout Madison, and the Henry County (KY) Local -- gave us great coverage, with several added features and photographs.

The RCHS reprint of the *Osgood Journal* series on Harding and Union Flat Rock Church, sponsored by a grant from the Ripley County Community Foundation, sold very well and is now into its second printing in time for the Milan Sesquicentennial in July.

Mrs. Petronia Belmar, superb gospel singer from Louisville, KY, highlighted the Versailles ceremonies. The choir, color guard and jazz band from Jennings County High School were brilliant at Union Flat Rock Church, and the choir from the First Baptist Church in Eminence, KY, was thrilling.

So many contributed time and talents to this momentous RCHS triumph, it's impossible to name everyone.

THIRD HERITAGE TOUR POSTS IN PLACE

In place before May 15th, were two Underground Railroad heritage tours. Boy Scout Troop 638 of Osgood and Napoleon and Marlin and Mary Hughes of Flat Rock installed the tour posts for the Versailles to Flat Rock. Jim Wysong of Sunman installed the tour posts for the Versailles to Old Milan tour. And on June 6, Boy Scout Troop 607 of Versailles installed the tour posts for the Versailles to Cross Plains route. The brochures and tour maps are completed for the first two tours – Flat Rock and Old Milan. The brochure and tour map for the Southern Route (Cross Plains) will be available shortly.

The first audio CDs produced had volume difficulties. We will record those sessions again with the cooperation of the participants, and anyone who got one of the original CDs can replace them at no cost later this summer. The script for the Cross Plains route is almost ready, and we can record that CD as well. By September, we should have the first three CDs available in quantity.

Accouches from Dr Jeremiah Roberts account book continued The book lists the father of the child that was born. Prior to 1882 when births were required to be registered, this would be the only birth certificate available. Dr. Roberts was a Holton Doctor.

Not to be left out Ripley County received their portion of the heavy storms and winds on June 3, 2004 taking out powerlines, trees and doing damage to the South Ripley Jr-Sr high school on Benham Road near Versailles. Portions of the roof at the main entrance were torn off and damage to all adminstrations offices, locker area and several classrooms.
