

## REPORT ON THE JULY MEETING

The Ripley County Historical Society held its summer meeting in Adams Township at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Roepke with 31 members and quests attending.

Betty Roepke, president, called the meeting to order. secretary and treasurer's reports were read and approved. the business meeting several reports were given. Chester Henderson said Darrell Day did not receive the grant he was seeking. Bea Boyd and Arriest Udey had completed the work on the Historical Markers.

Millie Nocks informed the society, Floyd Rayner had an old hay rake to donate. Norris Krall revealed what information he had about the Ripley County History Books. The company that printed the book would like to see a second book done. The directors will vote on the matter. Alice Glover had a flyer advertising the coming of the river barge called ALWAYS A RIVER which will be at Vevay from July 25th to 28th.

Phyllis Miller brought many of her beautiful paintings. She explained her ideas and reasons for doing what she did. years she has had people from all walks of life as her students. She is very pleased when one of her former students receives an award. At the close of the meeting she did a pencil sketch of Bea Boyd.

At the directors meeting it was voted to start the second history book of Ripley County. The directors felt that until a place could be obtained they could not handle large pieces of equipment. Dr. Glover said he would store the hay rake for the present.

## ALWAYS A RIVER

The Barge Museum was well attended. I hear the Vevay stop was one of the most successful. Bea Boyd attended on Thursday. I think the town on Vevay was surprised because they thought Thursday would be slow -- wrong! We parked at the school and took the shuttle bus to river edge. Then we also took a shuttle bus to the Markland Power Plant and Dam. It was as enjoyable as the River Barge.

The Glovers went on Friday to avoid the week-end jam and felt lucky that the line was only an hour long!

One really needed two trips to absorb it all. It was no problem going down the riverbank to the barge but when we came off into the bright sun, the return appeared hot and steep. At that moment an elderly gentleman, in attire from 100 years ago, in his trusty golf cart appeared to assist the "less-than-young-and-able" up the riverbank, even to your car if it was your wish. We went as far as the home-made ice cream stand. Many stands near the river offered exhibits, souvenirs, food and atmosphere provided by calliope music appropriate to the event.

Asa Conover, born July 4, 1888, at Hopewell, the son of Thomas (b. 1848 in Ripley Co.) and Anna Conover, died September 12 at Manderley Health Care Center, Osgood. The Conover School was named for his Grandfather, Charles Conover, (b.1822 in NJ) and wife Jane b. OH, early settlers of Otter Creek Township.

Asa will be remembered as a fine old gentleman whose life touched many. He is survived by a son, Egbert Conover of Holton. The funeral was held Monday, September 16, in Hopewell Church which is still in process of being rebuilt from June 1990 tornado. The Church Homecoming September 15, 1991 was the first service held.

## STRINGTOWN ...

Here used to reside old Father Sutton and lady, whom I early knew and cherished as friends, dear to my heart. Their numerous children live here still, in peace and plenty. My good friend Craven resides a little east, -- an early settler -- wolves plenty. Sutton once had a fearful runaway affair, was injured but a little. J.N. Blasdell, whom I have long known as an excellent and worthy citizen, resides here in easy circumstances. All of whom treated me most kindly, as did their excellent families. John Smith was killed by the falling of a tree in 1854. Isaac Howery by the falling of a limb in a storm in 1836. John F. Beal had his thigh and his ribs all badly broken by a fall from a tree. Isaac N. Blasdell once had a fearful runaway, but escaped unharmed, by a miracle. Vachel Lindsday dirked his own son, a lad of some 16 years, in a most horrid and fearful manner once. A Miss Tucker hung herself here, in 1842.

### MILAN ...

The residence of that beautiful orator, the Hon. S. S. Harding, who lives in a palace, and abounds in plenty, and brother to Dr. M. H. Harding, of whom favorable mention has already been made. venerable widowed mother died precisely as did Mrs. King, consumed by the burning of her dress, all alone -- had been left but a short time to be in company again soon, when, alas! it was too late. Her cries were heard but not apprehended. Full of years and full of honors, she passed this painfully away, loved and lamented by all who knew her. A Mr. Blackmore was suddenly killed by the fall of a board from a building. A Mr. Dixon and son were both drowned in attempting to ford the creek in a wagon, one of the horses also perished. lamented Judge Dennison once had a fearful run away, and was crippled for life. Old Father Swift twice wounded in the wars of the country, used to reside here, but has gone to his reward. His excellent widow still survives him. .....
