OCTOBER MEETING


The October meeting will be held October 8th, at 2:00 P.M. in the RCHS building.

Summer is drawing to a close. Where did it go? Every little burg has had its celebration. This was the 20th year for Clarence English's engine meet. Each year the flag has been raised to honor a veteran. This year the flag was raised for Raymond Stratton, who was a Pearl Harbor casuality. He was on the Arizona on Dec 7, 1941. I remember Raymond. He rode the same school bus that I did when we went to Holton School. The Strattons lived in what we called "Forest Corner", now 950 W. The Stratton School House was in the Forest Corner neighborhood. It was closed in 1919. In 1979 I interviewed Josie Stratton Franklin. Her grandfather Ellis Stratton moved to Ripley County from Jennins near Butlerville. When he came the area was all trees. He cleared off a spot and built a log house, later building a brick house. When he left Jennings Co. his folks said "Ellis, you'll starve to death up there in that wilderness. He came, Cleared and had around 300 A. Many of the trees were large sugar maples and these were used to make maple syrup. Ellis's children were : John, George Jake, Robert, Joe, Martha, Elizabeth, Mary Ella, Susan, William. The land was divided in Ellis's will. You may not find any Strattons there but there are lots of Franklins.

In 1845, British soldiers in India began soaking their white uniforms in mud, coffee and curry to blend in with the landscape-creating a new color which is still popular today. KhAKI

Lillian Carmer, Asst editor of North Vernon Plain dealer does an article 100 years ago, covering every town in Jennings Co. This on was in the paper August 8, 1900. A lot of North Vernon people attended the Osgood Fair last week. They report having seen "the sights" and probably did, as 2 saloons were said to have been doing a big business, as were 2 hooche-kooche shows and other sights. The racing was poor.

While visiting the Newcastle Hall of Fame, my son bought a Postcard of the Butlerville Squirrel Stunt. This was the only information on the card. This happened in 1923. According to the story the boys dreamed up the stunt, checked with their coach, Herbert Whitcomband used it several times. It flabbergasted the opposition, referee and the IHSAA who later made a ruling against it. Raymond Rees, a 6'4" center, and Merlin Swarthout, 5', 100lb forward. Rees would position himself in front of the goal. Swarthout would run toward Rees and scramble on Rees back like a squirrel and sit on hiseshoulders. The guard would throw the ballioto Swarthout and the rest is history. Rees weight was 240.
