RIPLEY COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY MINUTES By Frank Keenan, Secretary

The spring quarterly meeting, held at the Society's Archives Building on April 12, 2015, was called to order by President Cheryl Welch at 2:00 p.m. Cheryl led attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance. Secretary Keenan read the minutes for the winter 2015 quarterly meeting, which were approved as read. Treasurer Owen Menchhofer reported that instead of the customary \$5000.00 payment to the Society for keeping certain County records at the Archives building for the County Commissioners, we received only \$4500.00 this year. The Treasurer's report was also approved as presented.

Cheryl Welch reported that we purchased a new laptop and a new projector with the remainder of the Tyson Fund grant. We can scan twice a week at the Courthouse. Cheryl gave a demo to the attendees of a 1934 Osgood Journal article with the projector. We can charge if researchers want articles printed.

Sandy Meisberger gave an update on cemetery records. She also said that we must get copies of the Kralls' World War II Veterans book to the schools.

Cheryl announced the slate of new directors for 2015-2018, including Duane Drockelman for Adams Township; Frank Keenen for Brown Twp.; Bill Gloyd for Center Twp.; Lois Workman for Delaware Twp.; and member at large, Sandra Meisberger. Cheryl called for nominatiions from the floor and none being presented, the slate was approved by attendees. Delbert Abplanalp announced that an annual event well worth attending would be held at the Spring Grove Cemetery and Arboretum in Cincinnati, Ohio, on April 26, 2015.

Duane Drockelman presented information on the 2016 Indiana Bicentennial Celebration. A torch will be carried 2300 miles from Corydon to every county. It will go through Ripley County on September 17, 2016. Twenty nominees for torch bearers are being sought. The Bicentennial for the state of Indiana will occur during 2016, whereas Ripley County will celebrate its Bicentennial in 2018. Suggestions were made regarding a talk on the history of Ripley County. It was proposed that we put a notice in the newspapers, in the town hall, and in the schools for volunteers. Other suggestions included doing a video of the community, and advertising on the RCHS Facebook page. It was brought up that Napoleon would celebrate its 200 year Bicentennial in 2020.

The July 12, 2015 meeting will be an ice cream social, featuring a program by Mike Stratton on Otter Village. Members are urged to bring their freezers full of their favorite ice cream. Jackson Township will supply drinks and other refreshments. After a most interesting program on Hassmer Hill presented by Connie Kelley, the meeting was adjourned.

THE BIRTH OF THE VERSAILLES STATE PARK BY TOM KRUMM

The history books say the Versailles State Park started in 1943 when The National Park Service transferred 5,904 acres of land to the Indiana Park Service. In reality, the park began on October 11, 1934, when 1500 acres were purchased so the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) #596 could employ approximately 200 unemployed men to build cabins to live in while they planted thousands of trees on marginal land.

One in four of the local citizens was unemployed and had no money to buy food for themselves or their families. If they joined the CORE, they were paid \$30. A month and \$25. Of this money was sent back to their homes. This was one of several programs that began to rebuild our society and helped us improve our land.

An additional 4400 acres were acquired by 1943. Alvin Busching remembers when he had to move in 1937. He lived on his grandfather's farm which was bought by the Federal Government for the CCC camp. More than 60 families gave up their land in the thirties and forties to b uild the present day park.

Laughery Creek runs through the park, and an earthen dam was built in 1955 to create a 230 acre lake. The versailles Lake provides fishing, boating, and a water reservoir for the town of Versailles. Six bike trails have been built in addition to three hiking trails.

There are over 25 miles of horse trails also available for visitors who bring their horses. A 25 meter swimming pool with a 100 foot waterslide was built. Two hundred twenty six campground sites are available to rent in addition to shelter buildings. Thousands of people visit the park every year. The Versailles Park is the second largest park in the state of Indiana.
