RIPLEY COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY MINUTES

The summer quarterly meeting was held at the Society's Archives Building on July 10, 2016. The meeting was called to order by President Cheryl Welch at 2:00 p.m. following which she led attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance. Secretary Frank Keenan read the minutes for the spring 2016 quarterly meeting, which were prepared by Adams Township Director Duane Drockelman, as Frank was unable to attend the spring meeting. Thank you, Duane. The minutes were approved as read. Owen Menchhofer's Treasurer's Report was distributed and approved by the attendees.

President Welch advised that the DAR is in the process of updating their 1928 plaque commemorating the County's Revolutionary War veterans and some of their wives. The new plaque will add other honored names, and will be made of wood in the shape of Ripley County. Cheryl also noted that grant submissions to the Tyson fund were due in September and suggested that we apply for a new and more efficient copier at the Archives which would be a great help for our archives' volunteers.

Cheryl announced that RCHS Treasurer Owen Menchhofer has been selected to be a torch bearer for the Bicentennial Celebration Parade in Versailles on September 17, 2016.

Otter Creek Director Mike Stratton noted that of the 40 historical markers placed throughout the county by the society, 2 have been destroyed and 8 to 13 need repairs/rejuvenation. Mike estimated that the maximum cost of the repairs could reach as much as \$2000.00. Adams Township Director Drockelman moved to withdraw \$2000.00 from the Society's savings account to cover the cost, which motion was seconded by Barb Eades. The motion passed unanimously.

The program was presented by Josephine Keenan, whose debut book, **In Those First Bright Days of Elvis**, Book I of the series, **The Days of Elvis**, was launched on May 2, 2016, by Pen-L Publishing, headquartered in Fayetteville, Arkansas. Although the book bears his name, Elvin Presley appears only as a secondary character who, after a Hillbilly Amateur concert before his meteoric rise to fame, strikes up an unlikely friendship with a young girl who is struggling with the after-effects of her broken home. Having attended the concert on a whim, the night proves to be a turning point in her life, when she encounters a lookalike, sees for the first time the boy who will be the love of her life, and meets Elvis, whose casual comment about a light bulb becomes a driving force in her pursuit of self-worth.

Unaware that her longing to feel loved and valued stems from her need to have her father in her life, Julie goes down the wrong path, seeking popularity and an older boy's affection as substitutes for her missing father's guidance and support.

In Those First Bright Days of Elvis weaves a story of human anguish and betrayal; it recreates the "golden days" of drive-in movies, screen wire petticoats, and flashy American cars, when the world seemed brighter and more innocent than today. The book can be purchased on Amazon, or at Village Lights Bookstore in Madison, IN on September 24, where Josephine will also be signing copies. Look for Book II in the spring of 2017.

The keynote of this Estate seems to be comfort and sports, which enable the world weary Millionaire to relax and imagine he is "just a man". Everywhere the sports idea is suggested and reminders of former scenes of pleasure deck the Lodge. Some are quite startling. The Stroller started back in dismay at the sight of "Old Tige" sprawled at the entrance of the regular living room. As he failed to bark or growl, she decided he was not a watch dog but a very real imitation of "man's loved companion". Each door suggests varieties of "Huskies" but what would an Alaskan native say to "my Lady's Pomeranian"? The stroller was very glad that the numerous bear skins and the mountain lion skin with open mouths filled with cruel looking teeth were the reminders of the Proprietor's cause instead of the bears and panthers which used to roam up and down Big Graham. The elk and moose heads also recall scenes of interest to the owner and his family, but they suggested to the Stroller the days of "Auld lang syne" when herds of deer roamed over the hills of old Shelby Township. Fishing on Big Graham must seem tame to the present owner after fishing in the Everglades, Columbia River, etc. as suggested by "the Big Fish". Is it a Tarpon? Anyway it is " a whale of a fish". Fishing in Big Graham was sport and meat too for the Pioneers of Shelby Township, and the dug out canoe of the dusky savage floated down after the finny tribe and the scalps of the white man. Two kinds of sports, yes, different indeed".

Two enormous fireplaces, one at each end of the room, with andirons, tongs and old fireplace cooking utensils unobtrusively supplemented by several pieces of modern culinary art enables the Thomsons to amuse themselves and guests by making a pot of soup, frying a dish of flapjacks, roasting a haunch of venison (if it's ordered from the west or Canada), roasting apples, popping corn, baking a pot of beans, a corn pone, etc. If either doesn't turn out right no difference for there is a competent cook with a modern range and cooking utensils in the kitchen. Not so in the one room log cabin of the pioneer.

The upstairs and downstairs bedrooms show preparations for the confortable lodging of many guests. The ladies' bedroom contains a hugh four poster bed covered with a patchwork quilt which look as if great grandmother had fashioned "a bone of contention" for the for the Superintendent said that the ladies quarreled for the privilege of sleeping in the four poster. The other beds in this room and in the boys' room were single modern beds made at Berea College and furnished with spreads and mattresses also the handiwork of Berea students. Again the old and new hob-nob with but a tiny clash. Comfort galore but do millionaires" guests ever snore? If so imagine the music issuing from these rooms during the "wee sam" hours of the night. Occasionally a book, a bedroom slipper, a bit of dainty longerie or a tie flung on a dresser, bed, table or chair gave a homelike atmosphere to the upstairs rooms.
