The Ripley County Historical Society has been gifted the diaries and copies of the poems by **Roxanna Roberts Harrington** of Milan. The diaries date from 1927-1981.



Roxanna Roberts Harrington, only child of Samuel and Minnie Taylor Roberts was born in the Pleasant Hill neighborhood in Ripley County, September 10, 1982 and departed this life December 2, 1981. Her early years were spent in Ripley County. She graduated from Aurora High School with the class of 1912. She married William Harrington of Kansas October 10, 1912. The first seven years of her married life were spent in St. Louis, Missouri where her husband Bill was a member of the police force. In 1919 they returned to Ripley County to be near her family and the rest of their lives were spent in Ripley and Dearborn Counties. In September 1945, Roxanna started a dress shop in Milan and for the next 20 years conducted a very successful business. She was a former member on the DAR, a charter member of the New Harmony Federated Club, Internationally Yours World Wide Friendship Club and the Hillforest Foundation.

Roxanna was a talented writer of poetry and in 1966 she published her own book of poetry *Lamp at Evening*. The following poem from her book was dedicated to her husband Bill.

Lamp at Evening
Across the hills from here I see
A gray old house, once home to me,
And often when the day is fine,
White garments flutter on the line.
Before I think, surprised I say,
"Just look, why Mother's washed today".
When evening dews fall cool and damp,
Someone who lives there, lights a lamp,
Then I forget how years have flown,
Forget the sorrow I have known.
Across the Hills shines Mother's light,
Still bidding me a fond "Good Night".

Ripley County is Rich in History

The area known now as Ripley County has a multi-national history. After the ancient mound builders mysteriously disappeared, the Miami, Delaware, Potawatomi, and Shawnee natives hunted the area. The Shawnee named the nearby Ohio River "Spay Laweetheppie," or "beautiful river." The first Europeans in the area were French explorers traveling south from Montreal under the direction of Rene Robert Cavelier Sieur de La Salle. That was around 1673. In 1763, Col. Archibald Lochry and his one hundred eighty troops were captured at the mouth of the creek now bearing his name. One of his troops, William Ross, was in the creek when he was discovered by the natives. To make his escape, he ran up a little stream, east of Versailles, which is how that area got the name Ross's Run.

In 1798-99, Benjamin Chambers and Stephen Ludlow made surveys as far north as Olean for Ross Township, Switzerland County, following an old native trail. In 1816, the State of Indiana began proposing new organizations for counties. Ripley County was born from these plans, and was originally divided into three townships: Graham, Laughery, and Perry. It was divided into five townships a year later, with the additions of Ripley and Hogan townships. In 1823, another division created eight townships: Jackson, Shelby, Delaware, Franklin, Johnson, Brown, Henry, and Washington. In 1858, another division created the townships we know today: Jackson, Otter Creek, Shelby, Center, Laughery, Delaware, Johnson, Brown, Adams, Franklin, and Washington.

As a whole, Ripley County covers 450 square miles, or 288,000 acres. It is 27 miles north to south, 19 miles east to west, with an elevation ranging from six hundred feet to one hundred feet above sea level. Numerous creeks drain the county, notable among them: Laughery, Otter, Cedar, Graham, and Ross's Run. It is common for these creeks to run dry in sections throughout the year. The timber growing is mainly oak, hickory, beech, sugar maple, poplar, and walnut. The geological formation of the county is limestone of the Lower Silurian. The population of Ripley County, 28,818 as of the 2010 census, sees about 40% living within incorporated towns. The ancestry is predominately German in the northern portion of the county, along with English and Scotch-Irish ancestry throughout. The religious history of the county follows those lines, with denominations in Christianity organizing Catholic, Lutheran, Evangelical, Baptist, and Methodist churches. Major commerce in the area broadly includes furniture, agriculture commodities, and lumber. The railroads were once the backbone of the county's economy, and many communities were located alongside them. However, the highway systems are now the main transportation vessels, with those towns located near them experiencing continued growth.
